

# Concept: Methods

Housing - A facility used to shelter an animal

Nutrition - The health value of food that is fed to animals

Health - The overall condition of an animal

Usage - How an animal is used for human needs

animal welfare - taking care of animals in a healthy and stress free environment

animal rights - animals should be treated with equal rights just like humans; animals should not be used for food, clothing, research, recreation, etc.

Animal Welfare Act - enacted to regulate such areas as animal transportation, purchases and sales, housing, care, handling, and treatment

malnutrition - inadequate quantity and/or quality of food for an animal

co-grazing - grazing different types of animals in the same area

rotational grazing - moving grazing spots around at various times to provide a continual supply of quality food

by-product feed - a food source or plant part that is primarily used for another reason and the "leftovers" may be used for animal feeds

"Fight or Flight" - the response of animals where they either stand their ground against a threat, or run away from the threat
