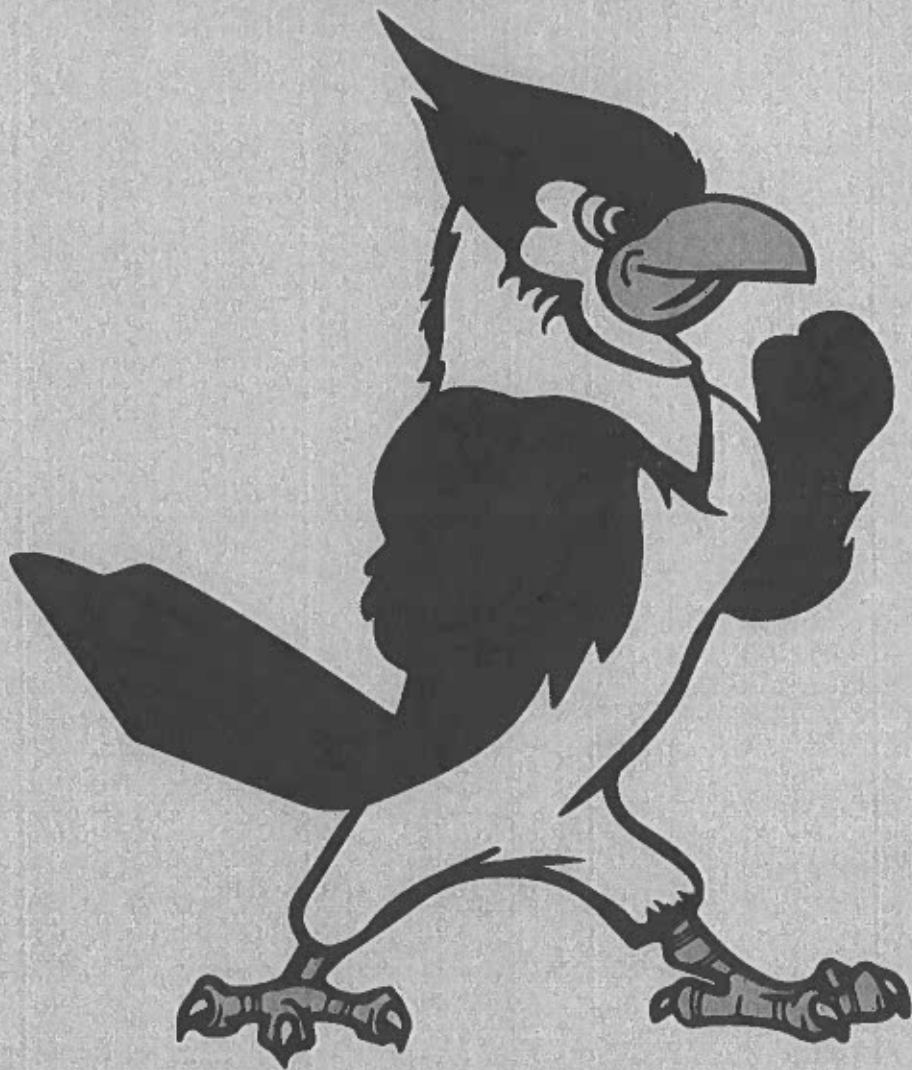



Craig Mensinger

Craig Mensinger graduated from Central Columbia in 1973, he was a multi-sport varsity athlete at Central Columbia, earning letters in baseball, basketball, football, and bowling. While participating in athletics at Central Columbia, Craig had the good fortune to be coached by his father Claire Mensinger, Don Engle, Duane Ford, Jerry Devlin, and Richard Michael. Craig was the team captain his senior year for the following sports: football, baseball, and basketball. He was a first team All-Star selection during his senior year in basketball as well as baseball. Craig was part of the 1973 District IV baseball championship team. Craig was also team captain for the Bloomsburg University Husky Baseball team during his junior and senior year. He was member of the 1978 Eastern Collegiate Athletic Conference Championship in baseball while competing at Bloomsburg University. Craig graduated with a Bachelor of Science Degree in Business Education and spent the next forty years teaching business management and coaching basketball and baseball at Ocean City School District located in Ocean View, NJ until retiring in 2018.

Steve Crawford

Steve Crawford is a 1984 graduate of Central Columbia where he was an outstanding two-sport athlete. Steve excelled in basketball as well as track & field. He earned numerous varsity letters in four years of athletics here at Central Columbia. During his athletic career he was a four-year starter in both of his sports. In 1984, Steve earned District IV medals in track and field in the high jump as well as the high hurdles. Steve was a dominant basketball player during his high school career where he was an outstanding 1,000-point scorer for the basketball team. He was an inspiring athlete to his teammates as well as younger individuals. Steve earned his Bachelor of Arts Degree in Business from Lycoming College and his Master's-Degree in Environmental Pollution Control from The Pennsylvania State University. Currently, Steve is the President of G & M Crawford Company and the Central Columbia School Board President.

Alissa Dewalt-Tobias

Alissa Dewalt-Tobias graduated in 2011 where she earned 12 varsity letters while competing in three sports: soccer, basketball, and softball during her four-year athletic career at Central Columbia. Alissa was a member of the 2011 Class AA District IV third place basketball team, 2008 Mid-Penn League Champions in softball, 2009 PHAC Conference, District IV AA Champions, and PIAA State semi-finalist softball team, 2010 PHAC Champions, District IV AA runner-up, and PIAA State semi-finalist softball team and in 2011 PHAC Champions, District IV AA Champions and PIAA quarter finalist softball team. Alissa was a three-time PHAC all-star in softball, a three-time PHAC all-star in basketball, was selected to the district IV senior all-star team in softball and was named the 2011 District IV outstanding female athlete of the year. Alissa demonstrated great work ethic and determination to accomplish her goals as well as strived to assist her fellow teammates in reaching their goals as well. Alissa attended Bloomsburg University where she earned a Bachelor of Science Degree in Education as well as earned a master's degree in Education from Edinboro University. Alissa is currently a second-grade teacher at Central Columbia Elementary School.

Eric McCracken

Eric McCracken graduated in 2013 and was a varsity letter winner in football and wrestling. In 2012, Eric was a member of the PHAC Conference Championship football team where he started at linebacker and running back. Also in 2012, Eric was a member of the District IV Championship Wrestling Team. He was also a District IV champion in wrestling in 2011 and 2012. Eric was also an East Central Sectional Champion in wrestling in 2011, 2012, and 2013. Eric compiled a wrestling career record of 119-36. For his efforts in both sports, he was named to the first team all-conference as a linebacker and second team all-conference as a running back. Eric was also selected as a participant for the district IV all-star football game and was named to WNEP's sweet 16 dream team. Eric attended Bloomsburg University where he earned a degree in Business Management as well as played four years for the Bloomsburg University Football Team where he earned the Don Hansen Second Team All Super Region One as a fullback. Eric is currently employed with the Steve Shannon Tire Company as a retread plant manager.

Lindsey Carl

Lindsey Carl graduated in 2015 and was a varsity letter winner in Cross Country, Field Hockey, Basketball and Girls Track and Field for four years where she excelled in each sport. Lindsey was a three-time PHAC high jump champion, three-time district IV high jump champion and a three-time medal winner at the PIAA State Track & Field Championships. She also was a district IV medal winner in the discus. She was the 2015 district IV track and field MVP, a PHAC first team all-star selection three years. Lindsey holds numerous records in the high jump, shot put, and discus at numerous local invitations as well as at Central Columbia. In 2015, she earned the honor of being named a 1,000-point scorer in the girls' basketball program. Lindsey competed at the post-secondary level in which she achieved the CACC high jump championship her junior and senior year. CACC rookie of the year award, named to the first team all-conference team twice, and was named track & field MVP twice. Lindsey was a multiple student/athlete award winner as well as an Academic Honors student. Lindsey earned her bachelor's and master's degrees in Physician Assistant studies from Philadelphia University. While at Philadelphia University she earned academic and athletic achievement awards for her dedication and determination to succeed. Currently, Lindsey resides in Chicago, IL and is a physician assistant in psychiatry.

The 1973 Baseball Team captured the Susquehanna Valley League Championship, Columbia County League Championship as well as the District IV Championship. This team completed the regular season with a record of 21-2 with many outstanding performances throughout the season. The 1973 Baseball Team was coached by Head Coach the late Don Engle and his assistant was Jerry Devlin. This team was comprised of many multiple sport athletes that excelled at each sport they participated in here at Central Columbia.

Fred Lenig-Coaches Inductee

Fred Lenig a 2011 retiree of the Central Columbia School District left his mark in education as well as athletics as he was employed at Central Columbia for 37 years as an educator and coach. Fred graduated from Lock Haven University in 1976 with a B.S. Degree in Health and Physical Education. While at Lock Haven in played three years of football where he held the record for the longest kickoff return in Division II football and participated in track & field for one year. Fred coached varsity football at Central Columbia as an assistant coach from 1981-2011. While coaching football he earned a 1981 Eastern Conference Championship and in 1992-1993 and 1994 District IV Championships. Fred also was the head coach of both the boys and girls Track & Field Teams (Boys-1984-1994) and (Girls-1996-2014). Fred accumulated a record with both teams at 164-97-6. He earned PHAC Championships in Track and Field in 2010, 2011 and 2014. He also earned a District IV Championship in 2014. He also coached numerous PIAA State Track & Field medalists including the 2014 PIAA Girls 4 X 100 relay champions. Fred coached, motivated and guided numerous athletes and students while working at Central Columbia. Fred had a knack for gathering the greatest talent and guiding them to success. Fred also was a great supporter of all the athletic programs at Central Columbia.

JoAnn Johnson-Blue Jay Legacy

JoAnn Johnson-Hansen a 2021 retiree of the Central Columbia School District was employed as an administrative assistant for 42.5 years at Central Columbia with 24 of those years in athletics. JoAnn served under four Athletic Directors: Don Engle, Bridget Mathias, William Forsythe, and Kevin Morgan. JoAnn volunteered her time as a coach of the Mifflinville Miffs T-Ball Team and coached the Central Columbia Little League girls' softball team. JoAnn graduated from Central Columbia in 1980 where she participated in softball as well as many other student organizations while attending Central Columbia for four years. JoAnn was and still is a great supporter, great mentor, and great assistant to all the coaches, players and teams that comprised the Central Columbia Athletic Program.

Central's defense staves off Schuylkill Haven, 14-6

Central Columbia, playing more and more like a solid class B contender in both the Susquehanna Valley Conference and Eastern Conference, Southern Division, repulsed Schuylkill Haven deep in its territory in the fourth quarter to score its fourth straight win, 14-6, Friday night at Central.

Along with the defensive stand, the Blue Jays also staged a scoring drive early in the third quarter to build on what had been a very narrow 8-6 edge at halftime.

Central even battled back from a 6-0 deficit. Schuylkill Haven struck first when quarterback Butch Blankenhorn went in from the one on a sneak in the first period. But, Craig Mensinger, the Jays' smallest but plucky quarterback turned the end to reach the end zone late in the first quarter and Brent Bankus dove in from the one in the third period.

Mike Broda also added a crucial two-point conversion following Mensinger's six-pointer.

The Blue Jays nipped a drive which penetrated their 10-yard line with 6:30 to go in the final period. A third down play found Derek Johnson, Mike Broda and Dewey Evans throwing Schuylkill Haven's fine quarterback Butch Blankenhorn for several yards loss and then a fourth down pass went incomplete.

A short time later, Central was forced to punt giving the Hurricanes one more shot, but the defensive play of end Tod Fenstermacher, guard, Joe Powlus and defensive end Jay Lehive thwarted the visitors' final attempt and the Jays ran out the final seconds inside Schuylkill Haven's 30.

The Hurricanes took the opening kickoff and returned it 34 yards to their own 48 with Wayne Brensinger carrying the pigskin. Ron Edling picked up first downs on runs of 11 and 26 yards and a 4-yard pass from Blankenhorn to big end Greg Boyer set up a one-yard touchdown plunge by Blankenhorn with 8:36 left in the period. A run for two points failed.

Central came right back putting the kickoff in play on its own 37. Key plays in the drive were a 16-yard pass from Craig Mensinger to Jay Dewalt and a 33-yarder from Mensinger to Dewey Evans with a roughing the kicker penalty sandwiched in between. After being penalized with a procedure penalty just inside the 10-yard stripe, Mike Broda carried five yards on first down and then Mensinger swept the first side from the line to score with 3:22 left in the stanza. Broda ran for the two-point conversion.

There were no serious scoring threats in the second period until Wayne Brensinger intercepted a Mensinger pass on Schuylkill Haven's two-yard line with 45 seconds to go before intermission.

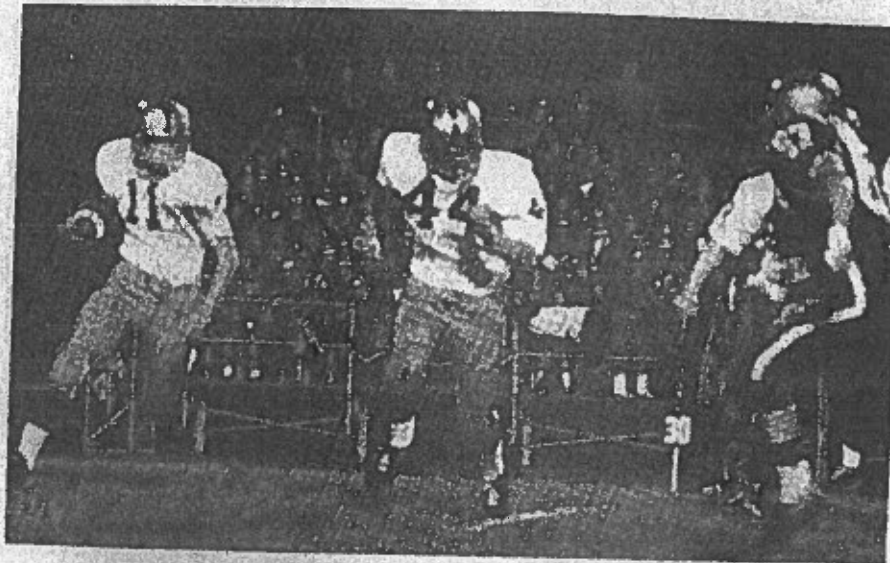
Central put a punt in play on the visitors' 36, completed one pass, but

Bankus and Evans teamed to pick up two first downs in five plays and moved the ball to the Schuylkill Haven 36. Mensinger carried twice for another first down on the 24, the Evans and Mensinger worked another to the 14. The Evans-Mensinger duo teamed again to move the ball to the Hurricanes' three. Then Bankus sandwiched a one-yard gain by Mensinger with two of his own for the score with 4:16 left in the period. Fenstermacher's placement failed.

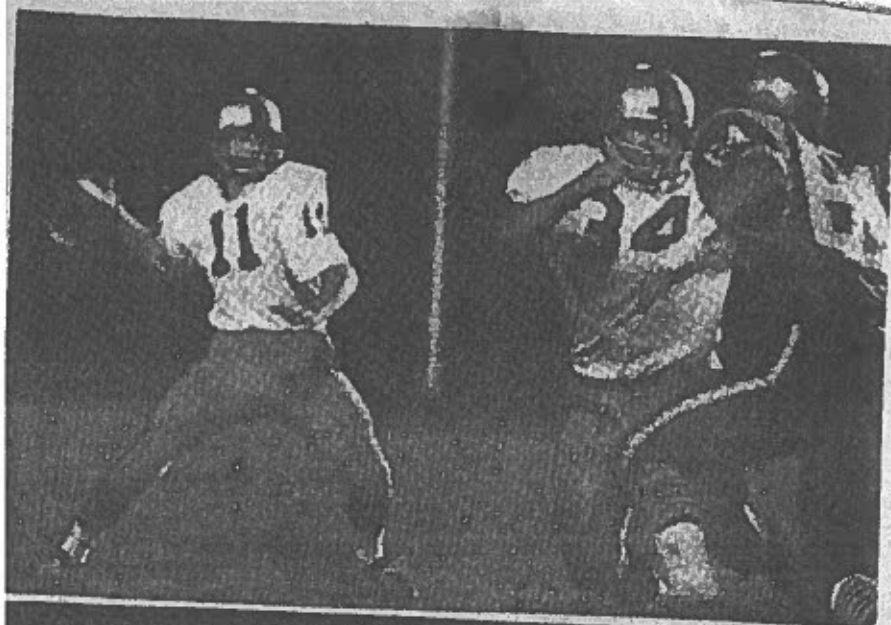

Central Columbia built up a 33-0 lead before allowing West Side Tech to score Friday night as the Bluejays defeated the Titans, 33-22, at the winner's field. Tech QB Gary Thorne threw three touchdown passes in the last quarter, but they came too late to be of help.

Central opened the scoring when QB Craig Mensinger rolled to the right for a five yard score. Halfback Mike Broda had runs of six and 10 yards in the second and third quarters respectively to add to the tally.

Winners added more points in the third period when Brent Bankus took a lateral and scampered 35 yards to paydirt. Final Columbia score came when linebacker Jay Lehive blocked a Titan punt and rambled 26 yards for the TD.

With a 33-0 lead, the reserves came in and Tech made the score presentable as Thorne fired scoring tosses of eight yards to Mark Romanowski and five yards to Dean Abbott. A 55-yard pass-run to Glenn Davis put the last Tech touchdown on the board. Romanowski ran for one 2-point PAT and Thorne tossed to Bob Farber for another two-pointer to close out the scoring.

Central ran its record to 3-0 for the season, while the Titans are now 1-2.

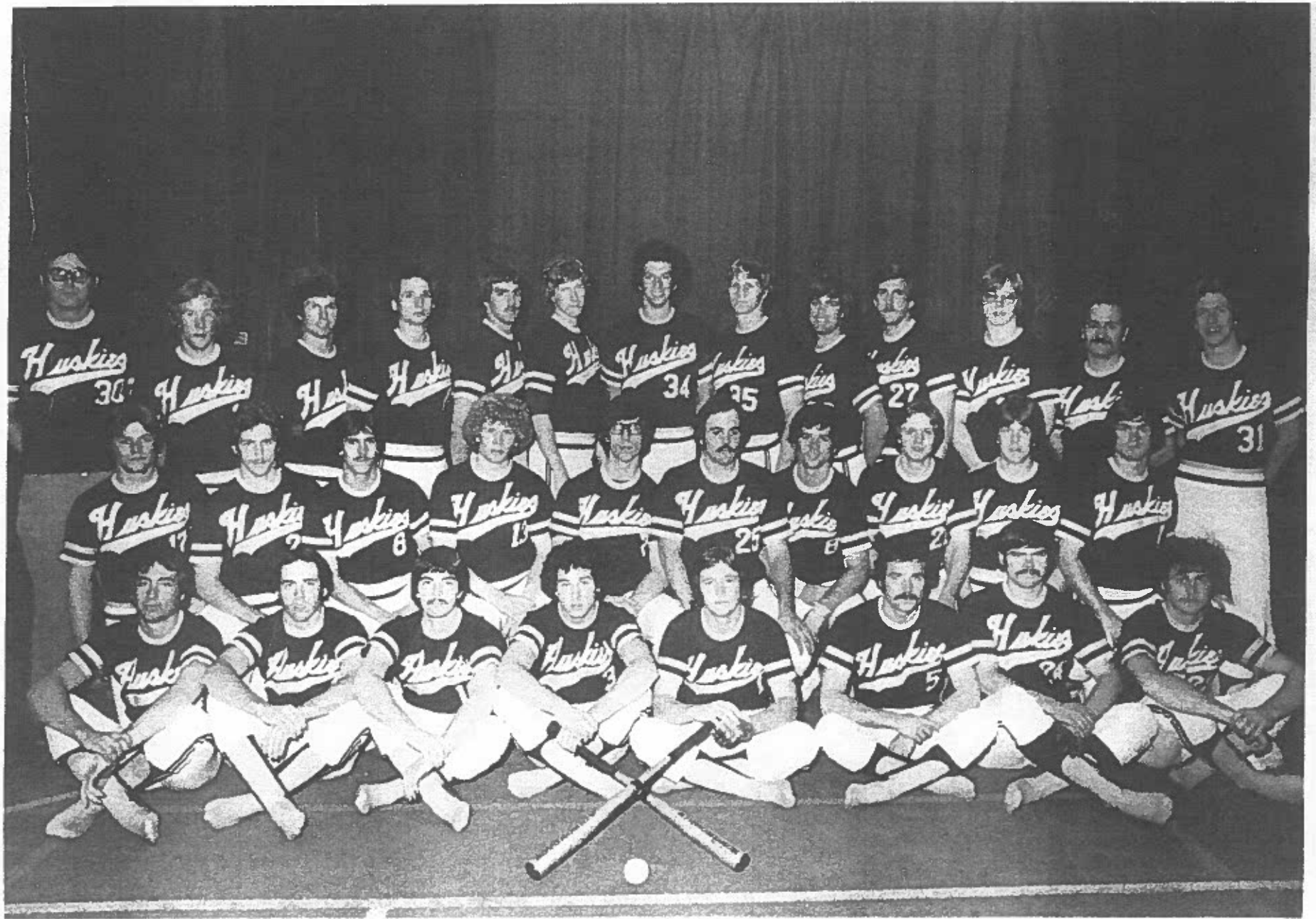

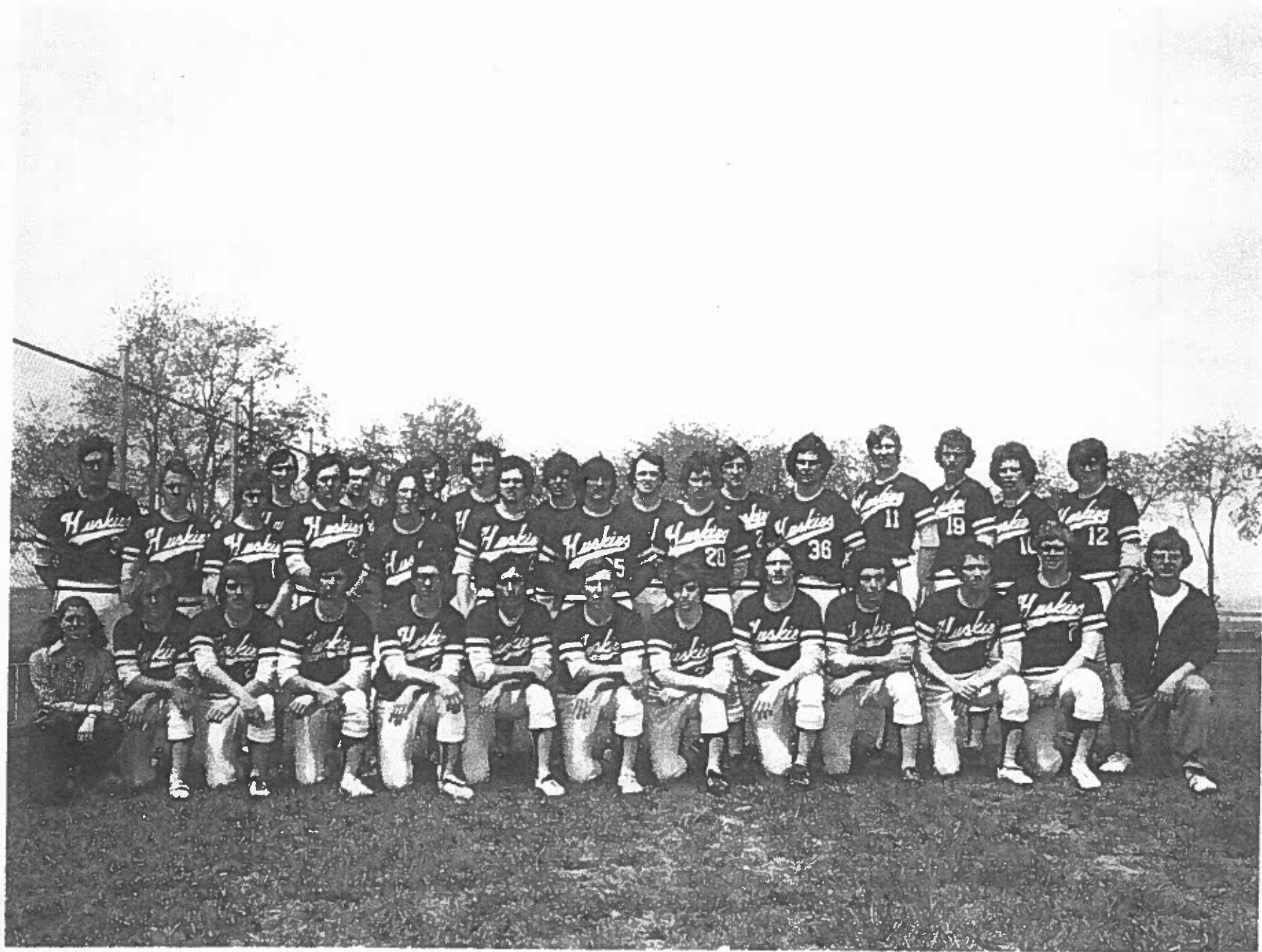

Carson Long finished a distant second to Melchiorre in the individual race. The versatile North Schuylkill end was on the receiving end of eight touchdown passes, plus kicking 27 PAT's and seven field goals. Long was fourth last year with three touchdowns, 21 PAT's and 10 three-point boots.

Mount Carmel's Ken Diminick finished third with 78 points. Panther Valley's Jack Sweeney and Mount Carmel's Vince Rawa tied for fourth with 72

Repeaters from last year's honor roll are North Schuylkill's Don Zimmerman (32 in 1972 compared to 42 in 1971); Bloomsburg's Mike Yoder (64 this year compared to 40 last fall); Minersville's Ron Bernetskie (36 this season compared to 38 a year ago), and Mount Carmel's John Muolo (who doubled last year's point production with 60 this autumn).

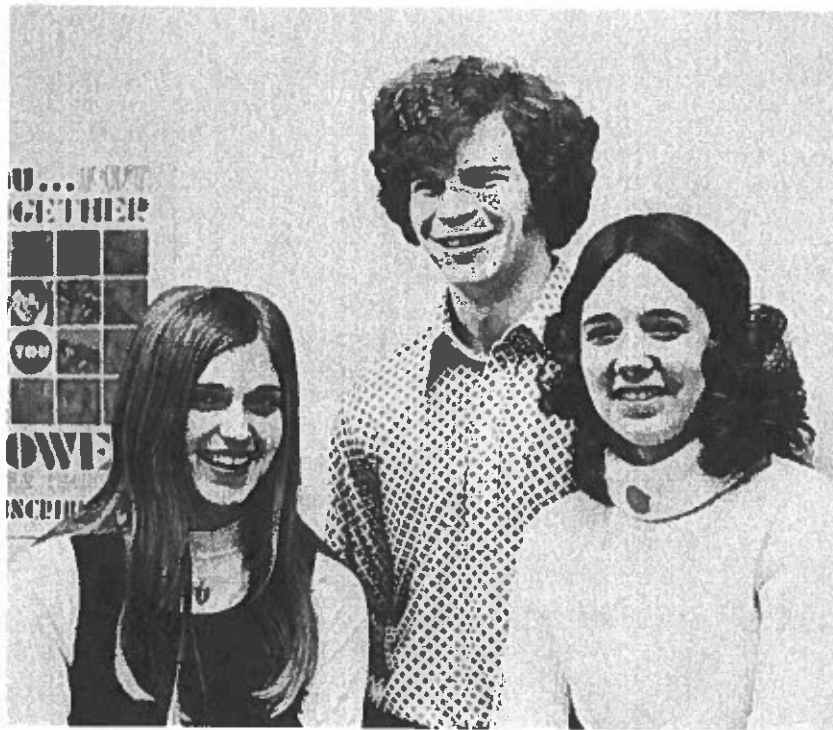
