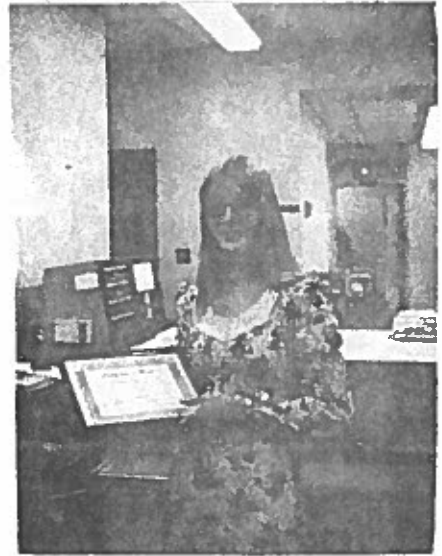
To make the most of our few years at Central, don't you think that we all should try a little harder to get along with one another?

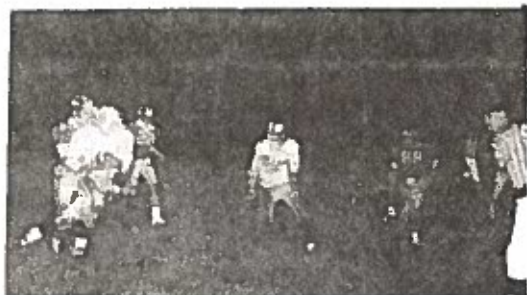
Mr. Harry Lumadue

Saints Nip Jays in Annual Homecoming

A last period touchdown drive by St. Clair ruined Central Columbia's chances for a happy homecoming as they came out on the short end of a 14-12 score.

The extra points scored by St. Clair quarterback Tom Boran after the first touchdown proved to be the deciding points of the game. Both Central's extra point attempts, the first a rush and the second a pass, fell short, as did St. Clair's attempt to pad its lead after its second score.

Steve Grasley scored both touchdowns for Central on runs of nine and two yards. St. Clair's first score came on an eighty-yard pass to Dave Berdanier, its second on a seven-yard run by Al Wertman.

Neither team showed any kind of drive until the second quarter when, after Fred Mills intercepted, Central drove to St. Clair's 25 where they fizzled. St. Clair took over there and went 75 yards for the first touchdown of the game.

The Jays didn't come alive until the third period when Mike Morucci started a 60 yard drive with a three yard punt return. The drive, highlighted by a 23 yard pass from Carl DeFelice to Mike Morucci, ended with Steve Grasley making his first carry of the night, nine yards to the end zone.

Central scored in the fourth quarter on its very next drive, once again started by Mike Morucci punt return, this time for 17 yards. However, St. Clair bounced back, scoring eight plays after the kickoff. 5

The Blue Jay gridders started out with what looked to be a promising season by downing Northwest 12-6. However, they proceeded to drop their next six games and stood 1-6 as of October 19. The following is a summary of each game.

Northwest

Central's home opener on Sept. 6 was an exciting game right up to the end. Steve Grasley scored in the second period which knotted the score at six. With 31 seconds left in the game, Carl DeFelice fired a 26 yard touchdown to Steve Grasley giving the Blue Jays a 12-6 advantage. This proved to be the final score.

Southern

Our second game was played against Southern on Sept. 14 on their field. Scoring a touchdown midway through the first period with Mike Morucci bulling for the score and Carl DeFelice booting the PAT making it 7-0 Central. In the third period Southern had excellent field position with the ball on the Central 37 following some penalties against the Blue Jays. The Tigers took it in for a score and made the PAT run making the score 8-7 and giving them the margin for victory.

Line Mountain

A hard-fought battle characterized Central's third game of the season with Line Mountain on September 20. Line Mountain scored late in the first period when Steve Grasely intercepted a pass and took it 20 yards for the score, making it 6-6. Carl DeFelice hit Todd Zeisloft for the PAT and a 8-6 lead. The score held till the fourth period when the Eagles sustained a long drive and scored, making the final score 12-8.
